### A SCRABBLE SHOOTOUT IN THE OLD GRAND CANYON

John Holgate, a top Australian Scrabbler that the British players had earlier met in the North American Open, relates his experience at the 1988 USA Grand Canyon Tournament.....

After five sunny days in San Fran I landed in the Grand Canyon, explored the South Rim, dined at the El Tovar restaurant and met players who had come from Wisconsin, New York, Texas, Virginia, Albuquerque and California to shuffle tiles on a rack. Of the 140 there were 50 in Recreation, 64 in Intermediate and 26 "highballers" (top-rated experts) in the Grand Division.

I started day one well winning 3/4 and holding fourth position. I missed MARAVEDI for 195 (a word I vaguely new) in game 3 (which I lost) but had strong wins in the other three games. My best play was finding a T for my INPHASE to make THESPIAN. The next 3 opponents were top 20 material: Darrell Day (whom I beat at Reno), Bob Felt and the number two seed - Steve Alexander. Against Darrell I hesitated to play NEUTRINO for 90 at a vital stage (I wasn't sure if it was in OSPD) and got locked out. Bob had a "no-brainer" against me after I played EAN and lost an early challenge. I recovered to have a 200+ win against Alexander. On the Saturday afternoon I failed to challenge Mike Willis' CALORIED, threw away a game against the 67 US Champ Rita Norr by challenging BIALY (a word every New Yorker knows) and played strongly for wins against Stu Goldman and Paul Avrin. My best play of the tourney was against Paul, weaving the letters I-N-S-E-R-T-S through a C and A for CISTERNAS. He was astonished and failed to challenge (CISTERNA only takes an -E!). I had a few problems with Chambers words like FLAWN WRICK and FAH but generally managed to keep them in my left hemisphere and play with the right side of my cerebellum (as Stu Goldman observed, "You beat me with half a brain"). I was about 7th going into the final day on 6/5. My first game was against Anne Hay who continued to block the board with a blank on her rack and finally opened at the end allowing my UNRATED to clinch a win. I still had a chance of a placing but played a woeful endgame against Dennis Leibhaber, then suffered a 200 loss to Alexander (who didn't even take time out to drink his customary mid-game glass of milk). Next to me Joe "The King" Edley was winning his final against Bob Felt (I watched their game as I played my last match since it was more interesting than mine). Edley finished 11/3, Felt 10/4 with Schonbrunn and Baron third and fourth. I came about 11th on 7/7, boosted my rating to 1920 but felt I could have finished 10/4 with more careful play.

It was a flamboyant tournament with players sporting yellow caps and pink sunshades (to help concentration). Competition was keen but friendly. Chris Cree (noted for his excretal expletive) boomed out at fellow Texan Jeff Reeves "Was that some kind of psychological ploy?". Jeff countered "Of course it was, dummy" and the room shook with laughter. Every player, once in a lifetime, should travel to the "Mecca of American Scrabble" - the views not bad either.

## MARY HAD A LIPOGRAM .

Lipograms are literary texts in which one or more letters have been deliberately omitted. They represent one of the oldest forms of word play, with examples dating back to the Greeks. The longest English-language lipogram is the novel Gadsby, written by Ernest Vincent Wright without using the letter E; it was published in 1939. It is said that Wright tied down the E on his typewriter to avoid the possibility of accidentally including the forbidden letter.

In very short passages, it is possible that one or more of the rarer letters of the alphabet will be inadvertantly omitted—these are not ordinarily considered to be lipograms. Lipogram construction is good training in creative writing, because it forces the student to choose his words carefully. In fact, rewriting a short paragraph or poem as a lipogram, leaving out a different letter each time, is an excellent exercise in learning how to express the same thought in different ways. To demonstrate what can be done, the familiar nursery rhyme 'Mary Had a Little Lamb' has been rewritten, omitting two of its most common letters (E and A) in turn:

Mary had a tiny lamb,  
Its wool was bright as snow,  
And any path that Mary took,  
This lamb would always go;  
It ran in class on a rainy day,  
Which was against school law;  
Boys and girls did laugh and play,  
What was that lamb in for?

Polly owned one little sheep,  
Its fleece shone white like snow;  
Every spot where Polly went,  
The sheep would surely go;  
It followed her to school one time,  
Which broke the rigid rule;  
The children frolicked in their room,  
To see the sheep in school.

Perhaps readers would like to try rewriting this rhyme without using some other common letter, say H, S or T. Or try some other piece, such as 'Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star' or 'God Defend New Zealand', omitting a letter like E or A.

How many letters can you remove from the alphabet before it is impossible to convey a written message accurately? Obviously there is no hard and fast line; sense, like the Cheshire cat, gradually fades away. To show the possibilities of alphabetic compression let's return to our original piece and remove half the letters from the alphabet, using only E, T, A, I, N, S, C, L, D, M, H, R and P:

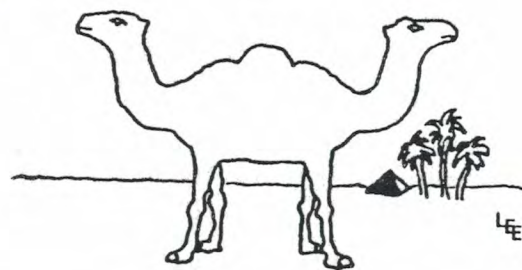
· Maria had a little sheep,  
As pale as rime its hair,  
And all the places Maria came,  
The sheep did tail her there;  
In Maria's class it came at last,  
A sheep can't enter there;  
It made the children clap their hands,  
A sheep in class, that's rare.

An even more difficult challenge is to divide the alphabet into two sets of 13 letters apiece, and rewrite the poem twice, using each set of letters once. For example, you might begin one rhyme 'Mary has a fubsy ram' and the other 'Pollie owned one piddling ewe.' If you can do this, and maintain the sense and metre of the original, you will have earned the title 'Lipogram Grandmaster'.

Saturday dawned misty and cool as players arrived at Tokoroa's Timberlands Hotel for the first days play at the 1989 Masters.

Local businessman Mike Fenton provided pre-tournament photos for those who wanted to remember the occasion.

Into the fray for the first of 23 games and 10 challenges were issued. From that figure you can gauge that players were sounding out their opposition as there were only 3/s and 7xs. Game two was even worse with only 2/s to 7xs. Game three saw players getting into the groove a little better with an even number of ticks to crosses. Game four also provides interesting figures, eight challenges and all ticks.

During the lunch break the usual looking up of dictionaries took place and the talk of "if only I'd done that I could have won that game", was a familiar phrase. Game five also produced more ticks than crosses but game six saw the roles reversed with 17 challenges issued and ten 'crook' words played.

Games seven and eight were rather more sedate with an even number of ticks to crosses. In all, day one produced 94 challenges resulting in 47 ticks and 47 crosses!

Day two commenced with a change of adjudicator and proceeded much like the first. At the end of an exhausting day's Scrabble a total of 115 challenges had been issued with only 44/s and 71xs.

A dinner had been arranged for Sunday night and a delicious smorgasbord was enjoyed by all those present. A great chance to socialise with friends old and new. It must have been a late night for some as Game 17 saw only four challenges the next morning. Game 18 was also rather quiet with the adjudicator occasionally nodding off to be awoken by a loud "Challenge!". Game 19 saw things liven up with 10/s to 7xs.

The busiest round of the tournament was the penultimate game with twenty-one challenges, but with the two adjudicators by this stage assisted by the two young runners players weren't inconvenienced too much. Some players had to drag themselves into the last game but still gave their all in order to pick up that last gasp win and maybe take themselves another spot up the rankings.

In review it was a new experience for both adjudicators and although we made a couple of errors, both gave of their best and were pleased to be part of the 6th N.Z. Masters.
