Howard won the NZ Masters at Easter and Blue is our new New Zealand Champion after he blitzed the field at the Nationals, Other tournaments held were the Dunedin Lion Open Tournament, the North Shore Tournament and the South Island Champs.

Fae Olson is the first person to clock up 2000 tournament games in NZ having played 45 games since the Wellington tourney in March. Fae reached this milestone during the Masters and is well on her way to being the first to reach 3000! Fae's closest rivals are Lynn Wood on 1780 games and Glennis Hale on 1633. Gerald Warner comes in at 4th spot on 1609 games. Me? I'm miles behind on 999!

New Zealand adopted the 5-point challenge rule at the Nationals, effective immediately. I have played with most challenge rules:- many games of single and double challenge and a few games of 5-point and dingle challenge. Of all of them, I think the 5-pointdon't-lose vour-turn-forchallenging rule could be the fairest. Personally, I prefer double challenge because I love the 'bluff' element in the game, but the new rule will still provide some of that nail biting excitement. The 5-point rule shifts the emphasis - instead

of you being 'punished' for an incorrect challenge by losing your turn, your opponent is 'rewarded' for a correct word by receiving 5 extra points. I'm looking forward to my next tournament where I'll play my 1000th game under this new rule.

Prize monies for the WSC were finally paid out in mid-May. Mattel decided to make the payments to placegetters and will pursue the reasons for the unacceptable delay

with those responsible.

Out Layout Editor has been very busy once again. She has given the Forwords masthead a good tweaking and it looks fantastic. Thanks Glenda for all your work, not only with the magazine, but also for maintaining the NZ Scrabble website, updating the ratings/rankings, doing the expectancies for tournaments and many other tasks. NZ Masters 2004

The annual NZ Masters tournament got underway on Easter Saturday at Christchurch. Top rated players competed in a 23-game round robin over three days. The venue was commented on as remarkable for its wonderful views across Christchurch city with the backdrop of the Southern Alps in the distance.

Day 1

At the start of the day two players were recognised for participating in their first Masters tournament — Julie Atkinson and Ann Hough. June Mackwell was also recognised as the first octogenarian competing in the Masters. A great start was made by Peter Sinton who won 7 of the first 8 games. There were four players on 6 wins, so they took 2nd to 5th places in this order: Howard Warner, Andrew Bradley, Liz Fagerlund, and Mike Sigley.

Day 2

Julie Atkinson was the first to achieve her win expectancy and earned the President's prize of a bottle of wine after the first game of the day. Peter continued on his winning way with a further 7 wins, staying on top of the leader board at the end of the day. Andrew stayed in contention with 6 wins in 2nd place. Steven Brown, Glenda Foster, Julie Atkinson, and Jeff Grant all improved their positions by also achieving 6 wins. Howard ended the day in 3rd place on 11 wins. Fae Olson achieved the notable milestone of playing her 2000th tournament game in round 14 — the first New Zealand player to do

Day 3

Day 3 turned out to be a battle between Peter, Andrew, Howard and Jeff, who occupied the top four or five spots after every round. At lunch Andrew and Peter were in front on 16 wins, with Howard on 14 and Jeff on 13. In round 21 Peter went ahead to 17 wins, while Andrew stayed on 16, and Howard and Jeff both won their games. Peter and Andrew both lost the next round and Howard climbed to 2nd place: Jeff also won his game and stayed in 4th.

Going into the final round Peter, Andrew and Howard all had chances of winning the title. Andrew and Howard both won their games to finish on 17 wins and Peter lost, remaining on 17. Howard ended up with the highest spread, snatching the title for the fourth time in 5 years. Andrew sneaked into 2nd place on spread ahead of Peter in 3rd place. Jeff won his final game to remain in 4th place.

Full results are on page 30. Debbie Caldwell achieved the highest individual game score of 593 and also shared the highest aggregate game score with Sheryl Davidson — 1001 points. Steven Brown took the prize for the highest number of bonus words — 52.

NZ Adopts 5-point Challenge Rule

A historic decision occurred at the 2004 annual general meeting of the NZ Association of Scrabble Players, with players voting to adopt the 5point penalty challenge rule used at the World Championships.

New Zealand has been one of the few countries, along with United States and Canada, to use the double challenge rule where a player loses a turn if a correct word is challenged. From now on the 5-point penalty rule will apply. This means that when a player challenges a word or words and the challenge slip comes back with a tick the challenger does not miss a turn; however, their opponent gains 5 points on their score for every word challenged, in addition to their score for the turn.

Examples:

Player A (Ann) opens a game with VIVO and announces a score of 20 points. Player B (Bob) doesn't know the word and chooses to challenge. The word is deemed to be correct so Ann now scores 25 points, but it is still Bob's turn; the challenger does not lose their turn.

Bob plays STILING putting the S after VIVO scoring 77 points. Ann could choose to challenge 1 or both of the words played. If Ann challenges VIVOS, the word is marked incorrect and Bob loses his

If Ann challenges STILING the word is marked correct. Bob now scores 82 points. Ann can't challenge VIVOS now after choosing to only challenge STILING.

If Ann challenges VIVOS and STILING the play comes back marked incorrect and Bob loses his turn. They are not told which word is wrong, or if both were; and Bob does not gain 5 points because of one word being correct.

If both words had been correct

then Bob would score 87 points. On the last turn of the game (that is at the moment effectively a free challenge) the 5 point challenge rule would still apply, the same as for any other turn.

Other Rule Changes

Apart from the 5-point challenge rule, the following key changes were made at the NZASP AGM in June 2004:

- To qualify for the NZ rankings list players must now have competed in at least 40 tournament games in the preceding 24 months. This replaces the previous criterion of competing in 4 tournaments.
- Removal of the requirement for NZASP to make a specified number of clocks available for tournaments — it now needs to ensure a "sufficient supply".
- Deletion of requirements for specified entries on score sheets as they are no longer used by scorers.
- Clocks are now to be started at the beginning of the game when the first player has at least one tile on his/her rack or there are at least three tiles showing face up which the first player can see - formerly clocks were to be started after all 7 tiles were on the first player's
- The rule on eligibility to compete in the Masters Tournament was clarified - it is to be the top 24 available players on the NZASP ranking list at the end of the previous calendar year.
- Rules for the NZ Challenge Shield were amended.
- Tournaments played at the ACC Masters Games shall be rated

All these changes come into effect immediately.

This 160 page book by two of the UK's foremost international-standard players is packed with strategies and information. Though perhaps a bit of a hard slog through Scrabble jargon for most novices, this book is a must for tournament players who wish to improve and hone their skills.

Andrew Fisher (now residing in Melbourne, Australia) and David Webb (UK) have divulged many skills and techniques of the Expert level player. There are tips and detailed advice on word learning, rack management, strategy, how to improve your game, endgame play, and competitive Scrabble.

The chapter entitled Mental Approach is of particular interest and discusses ways to mentally prepare for a tournament. How much study should be undertaken is covered. plus how to gain confidence in your word power. You will learn how to attain a psychological advantage over your opponent and other mental techniques are listed — drinking water and martial arts mindsets amongst them!

Andrew and David have illustrated the principles and skills set out in this book by taking us move

by move through a finals game between Mark Nyman and Joel Wapnick at the 1999 Melbourne Scrabble World Championships. Each move has been analysed with suggestions for better plays where they exist. There are clear diagrams of each move so the game can be plotted easily.

Collins Dictionary Changeover News

Jeff Grant has forwarded a bulletin which will be published in the Association of British Scrabble Players magazine. It updates UK players re the possible change from Chambers to Collins dictionary. There will be no change in New Zealand yet as discussions are still taking place.

AN UPDATE RE THE COLLINS DICTIONARY ISSUE FROM THE ABSP DICTIONARY COMMITTEE

In order to represent Players' interests regarding the Mattel switch from Chambers to Collins, the ABSP has formed a Dictionary Committee (ABSP-DC). This Committee is also part of a wider global Players (WESPA) Dictionary Committee. The DC members consist primarily of respected players who have been involved historically in the development of OSW and its associated word rules (Darryl Francis, Allan Simmons, David Webb, John Holgate (Australia), Jeff Grant (NZ)).

The ABSP-DC feels it most appropriate that all UK Club Players are aware that it exists and of the issues it is addressing. The ABSP-DC, whilst endeavouring to assist Collins in producing a book that might be acceptable to the players, equally believes it is important that all players, and not just those within the ABSP, ultimately have a choice should a Collins Scrabble word book be unacceptable. To that end the ABSP DC will also explore contingencies with Chambers.

Many Club players may have seen the ABSP-DC's recent article in the ABSP's magazine, The Last Word (TLW), which was representative of the disappointing position with Collins and the FAQ as at the TLW deadline. Since then there has been some welcome liaison from Collins. We now have some reason to be confident that less than 100 root words (plus inflexions) will disappear and none of these will be USA words. The root words that will disappear are relatively insignificant

to a player's useful Scrabble vocabulary and include such words as SYRLYE, EMBREWE, PICCADELL

(plus inflexions).

However, there is not time for the ABSP DC to assess the expected thousands of new words coming in from Collins' sources and check them against the base OSW word rules. although we have seen some sample pages and advised Collins on areas they need to address. For that reason, plus the key fact that the initial Collins book (scheduled for the Summer) cannot possible reflect the 2004 USA updates (which are still being worked on in America), we will not be recommending any 2004 Collins book to be adopted. We are also aware that if there are too many thousands of new words, that itself may be an unacceptable element of the change.

During the course of 2004 we expect to properly assess candidate new words from Collins sources against OSW-base rules, and discuss and agree a viable future update process. When the 2004 book is published we will scrutinise it fully to assess its suitability. We hope that Collins will make copies available for others (e.g. some clubs) to review as well. In 2005 a version of the book with definitions is expected to be published. That will be the earliest opportunity to reflect updates from the USA. So, it will not be until a 2005 AGM, and the publication of a 2005 book with definitions, that a vote and decision can be made.

This is the third part of John O'Laughlin's fascinating list. John, of Wisconsin, USA programmed Maven into playing nearly 70,000 games against itself and recorded all the main words played. Learning all these words will be an excellent tool for improving your game.



Confessions of an Inconsistent Scrabble Diehard

Age is like playing Scrabble — it's all in the mind, reckons June Mackwell. And with the mind, it's a case of "use it or lose it".

That's the key to success for the Auckland stalwart, who at 81 is still giving the youngsters a run for their money in the A grade of tournaments. In this year's Masters, she snatched back her 'oldest player' record from Gerald Warner (these two have been trading it for years).

Her former psychology studies taught her a valuable lesson about ageing, she says. "You can choose to age in the mind or in the body. I chose to look after my mind by playing Scrabble and here I still am. It's a key choice in life, I believe. Scrabble sharpens your intellect in so many wavs."

Whatever the proven benefits of brain sports for health and longevity. it may just be June's laid-back, positive outlook on life that keeps her going. She's one of those players who always seems to be laughing, joking and thoroughly enjoying herself. whatever her position on the

scoresheet or spot chart.

June grew up in Hamilton and shifted to Auckland's North Shore in 1970, for a job in her field of physiotherapy. Her marriage had ended, her children had left home and her parents had also headed north. In 1983, she and her long-time friend Mary Farmer were both doing parttime BA courses at Auckland University and seeking new leisure activities that would extend the mind. (She had previously played squash, that most physically demanding of sports, while raising her four children, until a crippling back injury took her off the court.)

The two friends tried Toastmasters and loved it, but gave it up after a year when the speeches "got too hard". They tried night classes in painting. but only lasted one night - "I'm not particularly arty." Then they had a go at Scrabble, since Mary lived in Mt Albert where a club had started about 18 months before. They both took to it with a passion. Says June, "Because we'd started at the same time, people couldn't sort us out for the first year or so. We'd both answer to either name, June or Mary." A key memory of those early days is the whiteboard on which all seven-letter plays were recorded. "Back then, it was an achievement for you to get one for the

night!"

She has since played continuously at club level, first for Mt Albert and in the past few years for North Shore-Bays (the three-monthly Jenny Ward challenge between the two clubs proves quite a loyalty test). She has also played countless tournaments. including five Norfolk Island festivals and 12 Masters. "At my first Masters, I came ninth and nearly fainted. I was a real nobody." Her best finish has been seventh, her worst 24th and she was a respectable 13th this year. She also came fifth in the A grade in one Nationals, which propelled her into the national rankings' top 10.

She's not concerned about inconsistency because, as she says, "I'm not a consistent person — that's just not me." These days she picks and chooses tournaments according to how she feels, whatever others think. She is competitive, but more with herself. "I take each game by itself. I know I can beat anyone, but I can also lose to anyone. Sometimes I can lose the plot completely — unfortunate choices are my downfall."

One of the charms of Scrabble, she finds, is that it is equally "inconsistent", with its mix of luck. skill and word knowledge. "Chess is cut and dried, bridge has the element of a partner. But Scrabble is so variable. Anything can happen. It can be the most frustrating game if you let it get to you. Personally, I don't lose sleep over it, or over anything."

Another charm for her is the social element. Scrabble has a bad image among the public. she says. It gets trivialised. People don't want to know about it. "But Scrabblers are marvellous - they just take you for who you are. You look forward to seeing them at tournaments. It's a wonderful chance to socialise in a relaxed, warm, non-threatening environment. The people make it such a pleasure to be beaten. And half the fun comes in between the games."

Coming from the mouth of Claypole, many young viewers assumed the word had been invented to spice up the dialogue without

causing offence. (The alternatives being the rather hackneyed comic standards "Cripes!", "Crikey!", "Yikes!")

Gadzooks can, in fact, be traced to the literature of the late 17th Century.

ROOT

"Gad" is a euphemism for God (see also. gaw/gawd/gor), which has lost its ability to shock as an oath with the decline of religiosity.

Gad has been coupled with many suffixes (gadsbodikins = "God's little body"). Zooks is a corruption of "hooks", which could be a reference to Christ's hands or, more likely, the nails of the crucifixion.

DISPUTED

Hooks could instead refer to **hocks** or **hucks** or **houghs** which would suggest a translation of "God's bones".

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

Highest Turn Score: Karyn McDougall (176) Highest Spread: Nick Ascroft (288)



Tahitian Kumara Soup

from Allison Torrance (CHC)

[Players at the Masters were treated to delicious soup at this year's Masters in Christchurch. Allison has kindly agreed to share her recipe which she found in *The Flame Tree Cookbook* by Sue Carruthers. —Ed]

Serves 6-8

3 kumara weighing 300g total

1 tbsp vegetable oil

1 tbsp butter

3 onions, chopped

3 stalks celery with leaves, chopped

1 tsp curry powder

2 cloves garlic, crushed

4 cups chicken stock or broth 2 cups milk

1/2 cup coconut milk or cream

salt and pepper

yoghurt or coconut cream for garnish

1 thsp chopped parsley

Peel the kumara and cut into small cubes. Heat the oil and butter and sauté the onions and celery until the onion is soft. Add curry powder, garlic and kumara, and cook for 2 minutes. Add chicken stock, bring to the boil, then reduce heat and simmer, covered, for 25-30 minutes or until the kumara is tender. Puree the soup. Stir in the milk and coconut cream, and add salt and pepper to taste. If serving hot, heat in a clean saucepan till almost boiling: otherwise cool and chill until very cold. Serve in individual bowls with a swirl of yoghurt or coconut cream and chopped parsley in each. (Remember to chill the bowls if serving cold.)


